Introduction: why EMACT?

- EMJM = outstanding network of institutions and programmes... but with very few (or almost no) relations between them
 - Many common problems and needs
 - Many potential cooperation in the academic field
- EMACT as a topic-based and problem-based approach but... which shall be smooth and light



Introduction: why EMACT?

Exchanging on our difficulties/needs on specific topics + good practices

- E.g.: insurance schemes, applications platforms, implementation of joint degrees, etc.
- E.g.: quality insurance mechanisms (sharing external expertise, practices, etc.)
- E.g.: teaching practices, etc.

Pooling resources or exchanging skills (for teaching/research)

- E.g.: pooling / sharing information about scholars' invitations
- E.g.: sharing online seminars or courses, pooling available skills/knowledge on transversal topic (e.g. on ecological and digital transition)
- E.g.: pooling internship offers, considering Master's thesis exchanges (for transdisciplinary topics)
- E.g.: sharing seminars / courses (in-person invitations or online seminars)
- E.g.: favouring transdisciplinary seminars/research on transversal topics



Introduction: why EMACT?

- Dissemination and outreach of EMJMs programmes
 - E.g. dissemination of joint information, working papers, MOOCs, industrial partnerships, joint social networking, etc.

- Collective actions to support changes in the current regulations
 - E.g.: overcome the resistances for the European accreditation process

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• 2020-2021: A first group of French coordinators (to face COVID issues)

• February 17, 2021: 1st EMACT meeting (constitution of the association)

• January 27, 2022: 2nd EMACT meeting (definition of an agenda)

• May 16, 2022: 3rd EMACT meeting (first time in-person) (follow-up)

EMACT and the Erasmus Mundus Support Initiative

- The EACEA has launched a call for the creation of an Erasmus Mundus Support
 Structure/Initiative (selected in 2023), covering part of the initial EMACT objectives:
 - Promoting and supporting the exchange of experience and good practices
 - Enhancing networking opportunities and mutual support for various stakeholders
 - Developing a collaborative structure for the community to complement existing initiatives
 - Promoting the Erasmus Mundus programme and showcasing its achievements
- The EMACT specificity as a (yet informal) but long-term representation of EMJM(D)s
 - Exchanging with consortia as peers
 - Regular meeting of the board to discuss main topics among consortia coordinators
 - Advocacy (European approach, national ministries, assurance quality agencies...)
 - Close interactions with the EMSI (test of the new platform, discussions on EM perspectives, contribution to conferences, surveys...)



Undertaken initiatives

- Surveys on
 - application platforms
 - academic cooperation (wishes of the consortia)
 - sustainability survey
- Joint work with EMA (Erasmus Mundus students and Alumni association): Alumni management tool
- Two initiatives in favour of the "European approach" (42 consortia / universities signing)
 - 1 letter for the Italian Ministry to ask for the implementation of the "European approach"
 - 1 letter for the French Ministry to ask for a free access the "European approach":
- Initiatives concerning the French Ministry
 - for the inclusion of the EM specificities in the new national platform for masters (TMM)
 - for the edition of joint degree with French partner when the French partner is not coordinating






2023 Survey on Joint Degrees **Main results**



- 34 Consortia
- Answers from both administrative & academic staff
- Mainly 120 ECTS programs
- Maturity of the programs: average 6,9 y
- Programs selected for 2 or 3 (consecutive) times as EMJM(D)
- Average period of funding: 11,5y
- Small Consortia (av. : 4,4 partners)

Number of Partners in the consortium (all respondents)




NB. Firstly define the Joint degree: The term joint diploma refers to a degree certificate that is issued by two or more Consortium partners to some or all students. Next to the joint diploma, there might be also partners that award individual national degrees.





64% is delivering a Joint Degree (A+B+D)




Type A: Full Joint Degree

2023 Survey on Joint Degrees **Main results**

- Top: Spain, Germany, France, Italy, Belgium
- 4 non EU countries (India, Uganda, South Africa, Sudan)
- Average of 3,7 partners issuing the JD (1 JD at 8!)















- Not covered by the survey answers
- Involved in less than 10 EMJMDs
- More than 33% of projects awarding a joint degree
 - Less than 33% of projects awarding a joint degree







Triangle: students start together at one university and move together from one university to the next

Fork: students start together at one university for a period and then are distributed among other partners

Hybrid: Triangle + Fork

Star: all students are separate and follow different mobility paths depending on their study track

Other: reverse fork; Hybrid: two first and two second year institutes, allowing for four different tracks in total; triangle for the first 1.5 years, then free choice for thesis; one semester together at coordinating institution, the rest free paths.



Qualitative data

- Describe the <u>PROCESS</u> of signing your JD
 - All different!

Expected BENEFITS

- <u>Academia</u>: Showing the jointness; joint academic recognition & cooperation, financial and institutional sustainability
- Employers: Clarity (one certificate for one masters)
- Students: not clear benefit; different reputation of the degrees in the different countries (e.g. Northern countries)

LINK with the EUROPEAN DEGREE and European Alliances

- Only 1 (new) EMJMD has been created within the frame of an EA
- Low awareness of the European Degree
- High expectations about the first results of the Pilot call on Joint European Degree label



Limitations, challenges & opportunities

Limitations / Blocking factors / Challenges

- Academic requirements:
 - e.g. minimum ECTS
 - Rules on on-line courses (NEW)
 - Interdisciplinarity studies
 different types of degree (NEW)
- Administrative and legal procedure:
 - Very time consuming process (the round of wet/digital signatures!)
 - The legal framework can bring (mis)interpretation; there are practices but not clear rules...
 - Rigid formal requirements (e.g. template, language) can hinder reaching a consensus
 - Creation of big University mergers with decreased agility and responsiveness

Reflections to be continued: towards a European Degree/Approach?

- Identify the comparative advantages towards final beneficiaries
- To which extent the type of degrees may have a significant impact on the development and sustainability of joint programmes? Which support from EC (mid/long term perspective)?
- « The idea of a JD is still not prominent at the level of European Universities. The needs and benefits are not yet seen. More time and networking are needed ».
- ► Legal framework & agile and robust administrative practices are key for the success of JD
- ➤ HEIs and EACEA play a strategic role and are catalyzers for administrative agreements and legislative change.
