# What is ICM?

 Launched in the 2014-2020 programme to fund short-term mobility of students and staff between Programme and Partner countries

- Manifold benefits for individuals and institutions:
  - ➤ Key skills & competences, professional development, enhanced employability, teaching methods, etc.
  - Increased capacities, attractiveness & internationalisation; improved quality of higher education



# Activities supported (I)

- Short-term higher education mobility for students, academic and administrative staff
- All levels: Bachelor, Master and PhD candidates
- Mobility in any subject or academic discipline
- Also supports traineeships for students and training for staff
- Study periods and traineeships of 2 12 months
- Blended mobility (physical mobility of 5 30 days + virtual component)



# Activities supported (II)

- All partners in an ICM project can send and host students and staff as described in their submitted project and provided that a relevant grant has been secured.
- For Africa, Bachelor/Master student mobility is only possible from Africa countries to Europe so African universities can send but not host these students. They may host doctoral candidates and staff.



• European partners may use a part of their **intra-European mobility budget (KA131)** to fund their outgoing students mobility under ICM.




# Who can apply and how?

- Higher Education Institutions (HEI) in EU27 and 6 associated countries
- The ICM application contains the countries and partner universities the European HEI intends to cooperate with, as well as its cooperation plan in each region
- This application is submitted by the European HEI to the Erasmus+ National Agency located in its country
- The selection of mobility projects is done by Erasmus+ National Agencies




## What is an OID?

- You need an Organisation ID (OID) to be a partner in an Erasmus+ project
- You can register your organisation online
- Your OID does not need to be validated by a National Agency to take part
- So don't worry if your OID is still "pending validation"







# Steps after selection

- Upon successfully passing the established quality criteria, European universities are allocated an ICM grant spread in different regional envelopes
- Project duration: 24 to 36 months
- For every partnership with a secured budget, an Inter-Institutional Agreement is needed between the main applicant in Europe and every partner university in third countries before mobilities can start.





- An Inter-Institutional agreement links the European University and its partner institution in a non-associated country
- A beneficiary grant agreement links the European university and its E+ National Agency
- A Participant Grant agreement links the individual with the European university
- A learning/mobility agreement links the participant to both universities

#### Inclusion concern

- Top-up for students with fewer opportunities
- Inclusion support (i.e. Health issues) based on real costs



#### **Organisational support**

EUR 500 / participant



#### **Individual support**

EUR 700-900 / month for students and EUR 140-180 / day for staff

EUR 79/day up to the 14th day and EUR 56/day from 15 to 30th day for blended mobility











- At least **2 EU Member States** or **third countries associated to the Erasmus+ Programme**. Among them, each participating country must involve at least **1 HEI**.
- For **third countries not associated to the Erasmus+ Programme** participation, specific eligibility criteria should be checked in the Programme Guide (per Region, Strand and type of project).





# Who can apply as coordinator?

- Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) or organisations of HEIs
- Applicant must be established in an EU Member State or third country associated to the Erasmus+ programme or in an eligible third country not associated to Erasmus+ programme
- The applicant applies on behalf of all organisations involved in the proposal

# Who can participate as partner?

 Organisations or institutions active in the labour market or in the fields of education, training and youth may also participate, but not as coordinator.

Specific rules per Region, per Strand and per type of project should be checked.



# Minimum partnership composition (1)

#### NATIONAL PROJECTS (open only for Regions 2, 3, 5a, 6, 7a, 8a, 9)

- Strand 1 and Strand 2
  - at least 2 EU Member States or third countries associated to the Programme
    - > each of these countries must involve at least 1 HEI
  - only 1 eligible third country not associated to the Programme
    - involving at least 2 HEIs\*

Exception: In third countries not associated to the Programme where the number of HEIs recognised by the competent national authorities is lower than 5 in the whole country, or in cases where one single institution represents more than 50% of the overall student population of the country, applications counting only one HEI from those countries will be accepted.



## Minimum partnership composition (2)

#### MULTI-COUNTRY PROJECTS (open for all eligible Regions)

- Strand 1 and Strand 2
  - at least 2 EU Member States or third countries associated to the Programme
    - > each of these countries must involve at least 1 HEI
  - at least 2 eligible third countries not associated to the Programme
    - > each of these countries must involve at least 2 HEIs\*

Exception: In third countries not associated to the Programme where the number of HEIs recognised by the competent national authorities is lower than 5 in the whole country, or in cases where one single institution represents more than 50% of the overall student population of the country, applications counting only one HEI from those countries will be accepted.



## Minimum partnership composition (3)

#### Strand 3

- at least 2 EU Member States or third countries associated to the Programme
  - > each of these countries must involve at least 1 HEI

#### NATIONAL PROJECTS (open for all eligible Regions)

• only 1 eligible third country not associated to the Programme

#### **MULTI-COUNTRY PROJECTS (open for all eligible Regions)**

- at least 2 eligible third countries not associated to the Programme
- <u>each</u> participating eligible third country not associated to the Programme must involve:
  - at least 2 HEIs\*
  - > national competent authority (e.g Ministry) responsible for higher education

Exception: In third countries not associated to the Programme where the number of HEIs recognised by the competent national authorities is lower than 5 in the whole country, or in cases where one single institution represents more than 50% of the overall student population of the country, applications counting only one HEI from those countries will be accepted.


## Lump sum II: approach – basic principles

Applicants must define work packages and detailed estimation of costs for each work package per beneficiary

Evaluators assess cost details during the evaluation and make recommendations if needed.

Based on this, the EU grant in the form of lump sum is fixed during grant agreement preparation





- > Proposals must score at least 60/100 points in total to be selected
- > At least half of the maximum points for each award criterion
- > Additional considerations apply to determine priority among equal scoring proposals



#### Relevance of the project

#### **Purpose**

- · Relevant to objectives and activities of CBHE and specificities of the Strand,
- Adequate response to current needs of the target country(ies) or Region(s) and of the target groups,
- The extent to which the proposal addresses the EU overarching priorities.

#### **Objectives**

- Based on a sound needs analysis; clearly defined, specific, measurable, achievable, realistic,
- They address issues relevant to the participating organisations and development strategies for higher education in the eligible third countries not associated to the Programme.

#### Link to EU policy and initiatives

• The proposal takes into account and enhances complementarity/synergies with other interventions funded by the EU and other entities.

#### **EU** added value

 The proposal demonstrates that similar results could not be achieved without the cooperation of HEIs from the EU Member States or third countries associated to the Programme and without the EU funding



#### Quality of the project design and implementation

#### Coherence

- · Consistency between project objectives, methodology, activities and the budget proposed,
- Coherent and comprehensive set of appropriate activities to meet the identified needs and the expected results.

#### Methodology

•The logic of the intervention is of good quality, planned outputs and outcomes are coherent and feasible, and key assumptions and risks have been clearly identified.

#### Work plan

- •Quality and effectiveness of the work plan are in line with their objectives and the deliverables,
- •The relation between the resources and the expected results is adequate and the work plan is realistic, with well-defined activities, time-lines, clear deliverables and milestones.

#### **Budget**

- •Cost efficiency and appropriate financial resources for a successful implementation of the project,
- •The estimated budget is neither overestimated nor underestimated.

#### **Quality control**

•Control measures (continuous quality evaluation, peer reviews, benchmarking activities, mitigating actions etc.) and quality indicators ensure a project implementation of high quality.

#### **Environmental sustainability**

•The project is designed in an eco-friendly way.



## **Quality of the partnership and the cooperation arrangements**

#### **Management**

- ·Solid arrangements are foreseen,
- •Timelines, governance structures, collaboration arrangements and responsibilities well defined and realistic.

#### **Composition**

- Appropriate mix of organisations with the necessary competences relevant to the objectives of the proposal and to the specificities of the Strand,
- most appropriate and diverse range of non-academic partners.

#### **Tasks**

•Roles and tasks are assigned on the basis of the specific know-how, profiles and experience of each partner.

#### **Collaboration**

• Effective mechanisms to ensure efficient collaboration, communication and conflict resolution between the partner organisations and any other relevant stakeholders.

#### **Commitment**

- •The contribution from the project partners is significant, pertinent and complementary,
- the proposal demonstrates the partners' involvement, commitment and ownership of the project's specific objectives and results, in particular from the third countries not associated to the Programme.



## Sustainability, impact and dissemination of the expected results

#### **Exploitation**

• How the outcomes of the project will be used by the partners and other stakeholders; how multiplier effects will be ensured and it provides means to measure exploitation within the project funding time and after.

#### **Dissemination**

 Clear and efficient plan for the dissemination of results, appropriate activities and their timing, tools and channels to be spread effectively to all relevant stakeholders and non-participating audience, reaching out and attracting relevant stakeholders to the outcomes within and after the project's funding time.

#### **Impact**

- · Tangible impact on its target groups and relevant stakeholders at local, national or regional level,
- Measures, goals and indicators to monitor progress and assess the expected impact at individual, institutional and systemic level.

#### Open access

 Materials, documents and media produced freely available and promoted through open licenses and without disproportionate limitations.

#### Sustainability

 How the project results will be sustained financially and institutionally and how the local ownership will be ensured.

## What are we looking for ?

- Clear and ambitious proposals that correspond to the needs of your countries and your institution
- Activities in line with EU overarching priorities and your countries' strategic priorities/needs
- > Results that make a difference on several levels: impact
- Coherence and effectiveness of the work plan executed by a competent team



## To be improved

- > Discrepancies between part B and part C (2 pages with KPI)
- Confusion between tasks / milestones / indicators / deliverables
- > Logical Framework Matrix (LMF) missing or not correctly completed
- > Weak needs analysis
- > Poor risk assessment
- > Budget insufficiently detailed with too high share of Staff Costs
- > Accreditation not considered for curriculum projects



## To be improved

- > Impact assessment indicators missing or not correctly identified
- ➤ The workflow needs →objectives →activities →budget→results remains, often, insufficiently articulated
- > Equipment for newcomers often not planned
- ➤ Too limited purchase of **specialised equipment** vs generic material (laptops, photocopiers, etc.)
- ➤In Strand 1 missing or too few newcomers, not well justified
- ➤ In Strand 2 lack of involvement of non-academic partners and innovation not visible
- ➤ In Strand 3 national impact not clearly identified



## To be improved - budget

- Pay attention to copy to Part A the very exact amounts of the Detailed Budget Table (Excel)
- Need to ensure value for money: reflect objectively if the outcomes you propose are worth the amount you request
- ➤ No depreciation: the whole amount of the equipment is supported by the grant, provided it is purchased 12 months before the end of the project
- > Staff costs inflated (both in quantity and in monthly rate)
- > Do not include financial audit costs (not eligible)

## Number and origin of participants

The number of organisations of a third country not associated to the programme must be equal or higher than member states or third countries associated to the programme



## To keep in mind!

#### **ATTENTION: WHO CAN BE APPLICANT/COORDINATOR?**

- Any public and private organisation active in the VET field and legally established in an EU Member State or eligible third country associated to the Programme.
- Organisations from third countries not associated to the Programme cannot be coordinators.

#### **NOVELTIES:**

- Cross-regional projects are not eligible.
- "Multiple submissions" are now possible (one organisation can submit more than 1 application)



## Financial mechanism – Lump Sum Type II

- Funding rules are set in the **Erasmus+ Programme Guide**
- EU grant is maximum 80% of the estimated budget.
  - Maximum EU grant: 400 000 EUR
  - Minimum EU grant: 100 000 EUR
- 20% Contribution from sources other than the EU grant (own resources, financial contributions from third parties or income generated by the project)

# How to find coordinator/partner



## How to find a coordinator or partners? (I)

- 1. If you already have contacts with VET providers in EU or third countries associated to the Erasmus+ Programme, get in touch with them to check if they plan to apply under this action.
- 2. Contact **European networks** of VET Providers (e.g. EVTA, EVBB, EfVET, EUproVET) and networks that represent higher education institutions also active in the field of VET (e.g. EURASHE, EUCEN).
- 3. Organization active in **lifelong guidance**, **counselling**, **learning mobility and career management** contact the European network <u>Euroguidance</u>.
- **4. Involve other organizations from your country** make your project stronger.
- 5. Involve other organizations from **other countries of the same region** it might be they have contacts to organizations from EU/third countries associated to the programme.



## How to find a coordinator or partners? (II)

- 6. Erasmus+ VET-related projects (2014-2020) on the <u>Erasmus+ Project Results Platform</u>. Please use the 'advanced search', selecting Erasmus+ Programme and within the different actions please focus on vocational education and training.
- 7. ## How to find a coordinator or partners? (III)

- 10. EPALE (Electronic Platform for Adult Learning in Europe) platform and/or you could register to the Community of European VET practitioners.
- 11. The <u>Katapult Network</u> includes a network and matchmaking tool to build relationships with new partners. The direct link to the matchmaking tool is <u>here</u>. <u>How does it work?</u>
- 12. If you are a member of the European Training Foundation (ETF) Open Space, you may look for partners there. In particular, you may contact the Network run by the European Training Foundation (ETF) that includes numerous VET centers in Europe and ETF partner countries as well as the ETF Quality Assurance forum that involves more than 20 countries. In this context, you may consult the ETF regions and countries.
- 13. Contact **National Erasmus+ Office** (see the list <u>here</u>), which may have received requests for cooperation from potential CB VET applicants.



## Useful tips



- √ Be coherent: avoid contradictions and "cut and paste" style applications.
- √ Be concrete: use examples, justify your claims, provide evidence
- ✓ **Be clear**: read the questions carefully, provide information in the correct order as indicated in the form
- ✓ **Be explicit:** take nothing for granted; don't assume that experts have prior knowledge; avoid abbreviations or explain them
- ✓ Be realistic: the application is the basis of your project to be; it is also the cornerstone of the commitment you will sign
- ✓ Remain focused: concentrate exclusively on what is asked of you
- ✓ **Eligibility:** make sure you have followed all instructions and that the proposal meets all mandatory requirements
- √ Keep it simple: use short sentences, vary the length if you wish to make it more interesting but keep it simple and focused.
